Lambeth leads first London-wide **HIV prevention campaign**

Lambeth is managing a unique London wide programme to cut HIV infection across the capital. Do It London is the public face of the London HIV Prevention Programme (LHPP). This £3.4 million three-year programme is funded by London Councils, which represents the 32 London boroughs and the City of London.

Advertising began in May on over 200 phone kiosks and is currently across the London tube and bus network, as well as online through social and digital media. National HIV prevention week and the Christmas and New Year party season are also key dates for publicity.

Research shows 33.863 Londoners are living with diagnosed HIV and 2,122 of the 6,000 new HIV diagnoses in 2013 were in London. Crucially, 41 per cent of diagnoses

are late, which has a direct effect on both the health of the individual and onward transmission.

Paul Steinberg, LHPP Programme Commissioner, said: "This campaign demonstrates the value of using shared resources to aim to improve public health across London. The message is clear: regular HIV testing should be a part of looking after your health, especially for those most at risk.

"Earlier diagnosis will help reduce new infections and enable people to access treatment. The campaign will also emphasise the importance of safe sex in preventing HIV and other sexually-transmitted infections."

Black Africans and men who have sex with men are among the at-risk groups who will be addressed by future stages of the campaign.

They are often selfless and humble and go about their lives doing things for others without shouting about it - let's give them the credit and recognition they deserve and nominate them for a Community Award."

Say 'no' to anti-social behaviour

Over the past 12-months there has been a significant increase in anti-social behaviour and litter relating to legal highs in Lambeth. In a bid to tackle this behaviour, Lambeth Council is proposing to use a Public Spaces Protection Order that will mean anyone using or supplying legal highs could receive an on-the-spot fine. Lambeth welcomes Shell decision

The redevelopment of the Shell Centre on London's South Bank has moved closer after the Court of Appeal rejected objections to the scheme.

The project, which will see eight new buildings built on the site, will bring nearly 20,000 jobs, hundreds of new homes and millions of pounds of investment in the local area.

Councillor Lib Peck, Leader of the Council, said: "This is great news and I hope it finally brings an end to the costly delays and uncertainty to this important development.

"It has already been subject to a thorough and rigorous planning process including a yearlong public consultation, approval by Lambeth Council and the Mayor of London."

Lambeth Street Champions

Last summer Lambeth Council invited people in 140 randomly chosen roads to become Street Champions. The response was overwhelming, and now we're launching the project across Lambeth so you can join in too.

This new approach is backed by Councillor Jennifer Brathwaite. Lambeth's Cabinet member for Environment and Sustainability. She said: "We know there are some fantastic people out there, constantly looking at ways to help others and improve the environment for the wider community. We want

to make it easier for those people by giving them the tools and support they need and hope that they will inspire others to do the same.

"The Street Champions scheme will give people the means to improve their own neighbourhood the way they see fit and build a wider network of people who want Lambeth to be a clean, safe and neighbourly place to live!"

The range of activities has already been impressively wide. Claudette has hosted meetings in her home with neighbours to discuss common

issues: Allan found funding to turn his community's dream of a garden into reality; and Kellie began drumming up support for a bike hangar in her road within days of moving into her new flat. She says: "You just have to get yourself out there."

The council offers Street Champions a variety of resources, from pink spray paint to highlight dog fouling to advice on fundraising. There will also be opportunities to connect with other Street Champions to share information and advice.

Last summer we invited people in 140 randomly chosen roads to become Street Champions. The response was overwhelming Lambeth residents Claudette and Will explain why they signed up and the difference it has made to their lives.



Will's story

"Developing community spirit in cities isn't always easy - particularly cities as huge and densely populated as London. People live busy lives, they move house often, and they like to keep themselves to themselves. In fact, despite being physically so close together, it's not uncommon to have very little contact with our neighbours at all.

"Going door-to-door to collect responses for an online survey I created recently, I quickly became aware that more neighbourly contact is something that is actually really welcomed by most people. I want to help with that. Just being able to wave hello in the morning to someone you've met on the other side of the street is surprisingly gratifying, and it changes the street you live in from a row of houses into a row of people.

"Of course every street has its issues, regardless of the area it's in. Bavent Road has its fair share too: litter, dumped rubbish, uneven pavements, no trees, and so on. However, a problem shared is a problem halved, and I'm adopting a 'strength in numbers' approach. I've already recruited more Street Champions to help me get a few things sorted, because I won't be able to do it alone. I am happy to be the first piece of the jigsaw though."



Claudette's story

"The reason I felt the need to support the Street Champion project was to bring some community spirit back into Trent Road. It's a lovely old Victorian street in Brixton and we have a really diverse mix of residents. Some of us, including me, have lived here for many years, and at least one was born in the house they live in. Unfortunately, the road has deteriorated of late due to litter and rubbish.

"Change doesn't happen by itself, and we can't always leave it to other people. When I heard about the Street Champions project I felt that this was my cue to step forward and begin trying to bring about change myself. I quickly realised that I wasn't the only one who wanted to get the road back to its former glory. I have invited my neighbours into my home for meetings and there are plenty of others who feel the same way.

"Working together to achieve change for our local environment and supporting the needs of Trent Road residents makes me feel like I am making an important contribution to my community."

Young People Matter (YPM) is a charitable organisation committed to nurturing the potential of children, promoting healthy living and fostering a sense of social responsibility. Life for the charity began in 2007 with a simple yet successful funding bid to deliver activities and trips that summer in Clapham.

The charity's founder. Ms. Kemi Folarin recalls: "There was so much worry and angst around gun-crime at the time. Young people just needed something positive to engage with, so I applied for a tiny pot of money to do just that."

Since then, the organisation has grown into a multiple award winning service provider with a youthful mind- set and even stronger social heart.

We tailored our children and young people's services to include breakfast and after school clubs and half term and summer holiday camps. We've designed curriculum enriching programmes focused on community and



citizenship in secondary schools. whilst continuing to run our famed weekly Boy's and Girl's Nights.

For adults, we developed the social enterprise training centre Aspire to Elevate offering free QCF (NVQ) courses, as well as some really fun intergenerational programmes working with seniors. More recently we launched a brand new community partnership called Stockwell Matters.

Stockwell Matters is the winning People's Millions (2014) campaign. YPM allied with local parents, children, youth, seniors, Tenant and Resident Associations and smaller community groups to win by public vote, a grant worth £46,602 to deliver programmes

Housing that A message from Councillor Matthew Bennett, Cabinet Member for Housing.

As you will know we recently brought the housing service back inside the council and that has given us an opportunity to test what you want to see maintained or improved. I am pleased to say that with over 2,000 responses to the survey that we did we have a good sense about what we need to do.

Firstly I want to say that we will make sure housing services keep running and that the key services will continue. However I am going to be picking up on the three themes that came out of the consultation: improving links to other services, communicating clearly and regularly and giving you more say.

The key challenges

Improving links to other services You want us to have a more joined up approach with other issues. The three that you have emphasised:

- health and social care
- crime and anti-social behaviour • environment.

We will look at how we improve the way that all of these services are provided to people living in council housing or on council estates.

Communication

You want to know what is going on and you want better information about major works.

We want to make sure information is relevant to your neighbourhood and that anything that impacts you directly is communicated in good time. We also want to hear more about what matters to you.

Currently we have Area Forums, Tenants' or Leaseholders' Council, but many of you have not heard much about them or they meet when it is not convenient. We will look at this so that we can give you better



ways to tell us what is going on and what we can do better.

Giving you more control

We want to look at how we give you more control over the services you pay for. Clearly having a well-run service is a priority and not everyone has the time or interest in getting more involved, but there are many of vou who do want to do this and I am keen to look at how we can do this.

Next steps

I am going to work through these three issues and come back to you with how we will improve housing in this borough and make it more accountable and responsive to you.

Thank you for all of your suggestions and ideas so far, and I look forward to continuing this conversation with you. In the meantime, if you have any questions, please contact communications@lambeth.gov.uk
