





Streatham Library will be hosting a special author event with Elizabeth Speller to discuss her First World War novel At Break of Day as part of Cityread London 2014.





Talking stories: A script writing workshop for beginner and intermediate level writers





construct these worlds within ourselves, but what we imagine can become so real, that real and imagined collide. A library danced! Experience a happening.










Chelsea Fringe Go Wild at Carnegie Library






Kamila Shamsie A God in every stone

ADULT LEARNERS' WEEK14-20 June


