New sexual health programme

Lambeth, Southwark and
Lewisham (LSL) councils
have funded a new sexual
health promotion programme
consisting of two services:
a sexual health promotion
programme for adults
delivered by the Rise
Partnership and a condom
card scheme for under-25s
which is part of the panLondon brand 'Come Correct'
and is coordinated by Brook.

The services provided include HIV testing, mentoring, peer support, parenting courses and 1-2-1 groups.

Come Correct is the London-wide condom scheme that makes it possible for young people (under 25) to register once and then continue to access free condoms from outlets across Lambeth.

The scheme aims to:

- reduce unintended teenage pregnancy
- reduce the transmission of HIV and Sexually Transmitted Infections

Outlets include clinics, colleges, youth centres, children's centres, libraries, housing organisations, schools, voluntary organisations and pharmacies. This service is free and confidential.

Bowie mural to be listed

Lambeth Council is set to locally list the David Bowie mural beside Morleys in Brixton which became a shrine to the artist who died in January.

Local listing would protect the mural. The council is also considering renaming the area where the mural is in Tunstall Place. The council is in contact with Bowie's family about the many suggestions for a permanent memorial, including statues and place naming.

Cllr Lib Peck, Leader of Lambeth Council, said: "It is ultimately the family's decision as to what may be appropriate. We must respect that and be patient. Lambeth residents have been overwhelmed by the outpouring of affection visibly demonstrated by floral tributes, messages and people visiting the Bowie mural to pay their respects to this unique 'Brixton boy'.

"We are also in contact with the Bowie fan club and other Brixton organisations who want to honour the memory and legacy of this extraordinary artist. We will share any word we get from his family that will determine what we do next."



The advertising contract for Bowie's widow's (Iman) cosmetics range ended so the poster has been removed.

Lambeth Council has commissioned photographs of the posters, mural, tributes and messages as a permanent record which will be mounted and given to Morleys, the 02, Pop Brixton and any other organisations that wish to display them. Morleys will preserve messages on the brick wall and non-perishable items like drawings and cards will be stored in the council archives.



Construction work starts on Your New Town Hall

Main construction work on the 'Triangle site' has started in earnest. This will involve: the demolition of Town Hall Parade and the erection of a six storey building to create a new; energy efficient Civic Office; Refurbishment and alterations to the Grade II listed Lambeth Town Hall and converting the Press building into a cycle hub comprising 260 cycle spaces.

The work means Buckner Rd is closed and Porden Rd becomes two way.



The girls were accompanied by their coach, Phillippa Towler-Green, who is a four time Silver Ice Dance medallist and European and World Championship competitor, and their parents.

The girls train at the Streatham Ice and Leisure Centre and, in addition to Phillippa, are coached by her mother Diane Towler-Green MBE, (former Olympian), European and World Ice Dance Champion and her sister Candice Towler-Green, British Junior Ice Dance Champion.

One of the girls, Rosie Hope, was featured in Lambeth Talk in 2013, when the Lambeth Mayor opened the new rink.

The girls looked stunning in their sparkly dresses, skated beautifully and represented Great Britain with pride and elegance.

Ice age

Ice skating was brought to England from the Netherlands, where James II was briefly exiled in the 17th century. When he returned to England, this "new" sport was introduced to the British aristocracy, and was soon enjoyed by people from all walks of life. By the mid-19th century, ice skating was a popular pastime among the British upper and middle-classes, (Queen Victoria got to know her future husband, Prince Albert, through a series of ice skating trips.) and early attempts at the construction of artificial ice rinks were made during the 'rink mania' of 1841-44. As the technology for the maintenance of natural ice did not exist, these early rinks used a substitute consisting of a mixture of hog's lard and various salts.

In December 2015 the young people of Lambeth voted me, Diogo Costa, to be their new Lambeth Youth Mayor. My brand-new elected Cabinet and I hope to use our budget to create some great events for the young people of Lambeth. One major event we will be hosting is a careers fair at Lambeth College in June. We want to make sure that it is really useful for young people. Because of that, we have invited many companies who can provide work experience and other opportunities to our careers fair. We have also invited universities to come to this event to inform young people about opportunities in higher education – and for those who don't want to go to university, we have got you covered, too. We have invited organisations that offer apprenticeships and help young people get into work by advising them on writing their CVs and personal statements, and improving their interview techniques.

This isn't the only event that Lambeth Youth Council will be hosting, there will be much more coming in a few months' time – you will just have to sit down and wait!

Learning on the job

Although apprenticeships in England go back to the Middle Ages, they have never been higher on the agenda, either locally or nationally, than they are today – and Lambeth is a leading borough in this new project.

Over three million new apprenticeships will be created over the course of the next few years and policy has been developed to put apprenticeships at the heart of most organisations. Taking a lead role in this, Lambeth Council is committed to supporting 300 young Lambeth residents into apprenticeships by March 2017, at least 50 of whom will be in the council itself. The Lambeth Working Apprenticeships team was set up to help us meet this aim and is meeting with businesses and hiring managers to support them to take on apprentices, creating opportunities for some of the young people who need them most.

Lambeth Council, in collaboration with the NHS, recently invited local health care providers to an event to find out about the opportunities an apprentice can bring. From the event, 20 businesses agreed to create 26 apprenticeships, and Lambeth Working Apprenticeships is now supporting those businesses



to find suitable, passionate residents to work for them as apprentices.

Lambeth CEPN (Community Education Provider Network), a network of NHS employers which come together locally to consider workforce issues, was on hand at the event to provide expert advice to the attendees. Lambeth GP Dr Martin Block, chair of the CEPN, said: "For local people, taking an apprenticeship in a GP practice, pharmacy, dental practice, opticians or care home is a great way to start a career in healthcare.

Apprenticeships are available in a huge range of both clinical and administrative roles and are not just for young people. I would recommend that anyone taking their first steps on the career ladder or looking for a change of direction consider whether an apprenticeship in primary care could be a fantastic opportunity for them."

Lambeth Libraries provide a comprehensive service across the borough. They are valued public services that play an important role in providing space, books and enabling community activity. To support that belief it is free to join Lambeth Libraries, and when you join you become a member of all of them.



However as Lambeth Council looks to save £800,000 from its libraries budget as a result of cuts to its funding the services are changing. But rather than closing branches, the council is changing the way they are run.

Despite the budget cut Lambeth Council is pledging:

- To continue to provide a library service at ten sites in Lambeth; just as we do now
- Overall, Lambeth libraries will be open longer and book stocks will be protected
- To continue to improve the service and deliver the commitment to open two new libraries in the coming years

Under the council's Culture 2020 activities and programme which plots the way forward is up to date



for libraries, parks, the arts and sports the following action is being taken:

Brixton Library – fully maintained service with existing opening hours

Streatham Library – newly expanded and refurbished in 2014, Streatham will keep the full service with existing opening hours

West Norwood Library – current building will maintain full service with existing opening hours. Plans have been agreed for a brand new library, with a full and comprehensive service, to open in 2017.

Clapham Library – brand new library opened in 2012, Clapham will keep the full service with existing opening hours

Tate South Lambeth Library – fully maintained service with existing opening hours

Durning Library – fully maintained service with existing opening hours

Upper Norwood Library – Funded by Lambeth and Croydon councils, the building will be run by Upper Norwood Library Trust, with a self-service library with librarians on site regularly to lead activities and to ensure that stock is up to date Waterloo Library – moving from current building to the Oasis Centre in Westminster Bridge Road, with longer opening hours and a full stock of books

Carnegie Library – temporarily closed until early-2017, it will reopen with a neighbourhood library service with librarians on site regularly to lead activities and to ensure that stock is up to date. To cover the costs of the building so it can be kept open for the community, we have partnered with Greenwich Leisure Limited, a social enterprise, who will provide health and fitness facilities in the currently unused basement of the building. The overall space for community use, including the library service, will remain the same.

Minet – temporarily closed until early 2017, although access to the archives will remain. It will re-open as a neighbourhood library service in 2017, with books, computers and study space. The council has also partnered with Greenwich Leisure Limited, a social enterprise, who will provide health and fitness facilities.

It started with a gardening workshop in a Brixton park a way for fathers and children to engage with each other and the nature surrounding them. Today, they organise outdoor classrooms, park sleepovers, and planting days across Lambeth.

Father Nature



Why... Father Nature (aka 'Fat Nat')?

"The name came out of my experience as a new dad wanting to interest my son Jago in nature. We went to a fathers' One o'clock club event in a Brixton park and saw dads standing around. No one was really engaging with each other or nature. Thanks to St Michael's Fellowship (the Lambeth Family Charity) we found a patch of land at the Liz Atkinson Centre and the dads started flooding in. I think men respond really well to hands-on projects. It's easier to discuss the challenges of parenting while working."

Why get closer to Nature?

"Being in Nature is crucial for our wellbeing, be it our mental health or to catch some sun and boost our vitamin D. We've got a serious child obesity problem in London and getting the kids outside is a vital part of combating this."

What are outdoor classrooms?

"An outdoor classroom may involve sheltered seating, a rainwater harvesting contraption, bug hotels, a mud kitchen, cob oven or water wall to experiment with natural materials, or dens to hide in. With our partners Natural Thinkers (Lambeth Early Years advisors) we're







bringing the idea of Forest Schooling to town and helping teachers take the curriculum outside, with great results. Four of the schools we work with (Sudbourne, Stockwell and St John's Primary Schools and Maytree Children's Centre) have just won GLA funding (the Whole Kids Award) for developing 'green teaching'."

What was the most rewarding moment for 'Fat Nat'?

"Probably watching kids I'd taught casually eating rocket and strawberries straight from the ground in Angell Town. I feel joy anytime I see anyone start their journey of intimacy with nature: a child's eyes when they plant their first seed - 'Look, I made a plant!'; the profound effect sitting still in nature has on people; kids making strawbale igloos at Lambeth Country Show."

What's your vision for the future of Brixton?

"Lambeth (and Croydon) are pilot Food Flagship boroughs in London and now is a real opportunity to show how we can make the most of our green spaces to benefit all the residents and to make city living genuinely sustainable. Good urban design is a vital part of this, and we'd like Lambeth town planners and architects to lead the way - using local organisations like ours to soften the concrete and steel, and address the health and wellbeing manifesto. We want to see roof top growing everywhere (including the new town hall!); food growing and rainwater harvesting on every street; Big Park Sleepovers in every park (http://www.fathernature. org.uk/community/the-big-parksleepover/); and all the nurseries, schools and community centres as recognised growing hubs for the borough."





How can people get involved?

'We're always looking for volunteers for community planting days, and anyone can contact us if they want to get into gardening. We can put them in touch with other growers. If they have an idea for planters or pocket parks, lust drop us a line at **hello@fathernature.org.uk**, tweet us on **@FatNatChat**, join our Facebook page and get on our mailing list at Fathernature.org.uk. Lambeth Council are very supportive of these kind of projects."

- A range of social events to cater for carers and their sons and daughters
- Bonus after 1st year of approval
- Peer mentoring to guide you through your early days in fostering
- Regular support groups
- Opportunities to enhance your fostering role, for example, joining committees and panel
- · Approved carers receive £500 reward if they refer a friend and they become a carer.

Lambeth Housing Standard

the next steps



The council has agreed the programme for Lambeth Housing Standard (LHS) works starting this financial year (2016-17). The programme has been developed based on the newest stock condition surveys from 2015 and local knowledge. The council can now direct its financial resources to estates and streets with the greatest technical need.

We plan to bring more than 6,000 more homes up to the Lambeth Housing Standard. As well as homes on large, small and medium estates, this will include hundreds of non-estate 'street properties'.

Free chips for dogs

Microchipping is now compulsory for all dogs in the UK. Since April, all puppies must be chipped at 8 weeks old. The fine for an unchipped dog is up to £500.



Before the new law, Lambeth Council worked in partnership with Battersea Dogs & Cats' Home to run a month of events on estates across the borough, offering tenants free microchipping and ID tags for their dogs.

- At Loughborough Community Centre, the charity fitted
 8 dogs with microchips and 9 with ID tags.
- On Tulse Hill Estate (Central): 5 microchips, 12 ID Tags
- Mawbey Brough Estate (North): 7 microchips, 10 ID Tags
- Portobello Estate (South): 5 microchips, 8 ID tags,
 4 new application forms to keep a dog.



Workwise is a partnership between Lambeth Housing Services and homelessness charity St Mungo's. It's to help council tenants at risk of losing their homes due to the under-occupancy charge ('bedroom tax'). The aim is to build tenants' skills and confidence to get them closer to employment – or, even better, get into work. First year results are very positive.

Jobseekers face many challenges: feeling out of touch with the jobs market; completing CVs or job applications; low self-confidence or motivation. But 70 Workwise tenants found full-time jobs including decorators, office admin, healthcare and nursery nursing. Four started business. Others do multiple part-time jobs earning enough to stop claiming benefits.

Workwise expected length of unemployment to impact on people's chances – but 33% of those who gained work had been unemployed for two years or longer.

Volunteering

Workwise encourage people to make their CVs more impressive with work experience. Tenants joined the council's 'Get Set Go' volunteering scheme, Lambeth Volunteer Centre and more. 54% of volunteers gained work. 11 people from 'Get Set Go' are now working towards 'Community into Housing' qualifications. Workwise and 'Get Set Go' were TPAS awards finalists for 'Excellence in Employment, Skills and Training'.

Social impact score


Measuring the community benefit of Workwise (using the Housing Association Charitable Trust (HACT) values for London) indicated a cost: benefit ratio of 1:19.94.

Customer feedback

92.9% of Workwise clients told a focus group they'd benefited from the support, information, advice and guidance Workwise provided. 64.3% said they felt more confident about their employability.

Fly-tipping tip-off gets a 'fine' result



Great teamwork from cleaning contractors Pinnacle and the council's tenancy enforcement officers helped Lambeth take effective action against commercial fly-tippers.


When Pinnacle cleared a tip on Woodvale Estate they found letters with a business name proving the illegal tipper was using our estate as a dumping ground.

A fixed penalty notice or fine wasn't possible – so Estate Pride Project Officer Steven Darbyshire asked South Area's Tenancy Enforcement "How can we use this evidence to act as a deterrent?"

Tenancy Enforcement investigated – and offered the business a choice: pay the cost of clearing the fly tip, or face legal action.

Pinnacle confirmed it cost £120 (more than most fixed penalties) to clear up the mess – and the fly-tippers will pay in full.

Walkabout results in planting and parking plan

Lambeth's Estate Pride team designed and delivered improvements to Clapham Road Estate as the result of the first 'Wednesday Walkabout' in November 2015.

Wednesday Walkabouts mean Housing Services staff (from the Area Office, major works and repairs teams, and – with several 'fresh pairs of eyes' – people from 'the back office') teaming up to knock on doors and discuss problems, issues and ideas with residents. The walkabouts lead to action plans for improving the estate.

The Clapham Road changes improve the courtyard area and create a relaxing space for residents. The area includes new refuse enclosures.




Point online goes live

Holderness Estate's 'the point' TRA have launched a website to feature their achievements so far – including winning the 'innovation' category in November's Community Pride awards – and look to the future. They say "We're a small but ambitious voluntary-run community group in SE27 near Crown Point, spanning the border with Croydon, run by local people, for local people."

The website includes a gallery of projects and a call for helping hands for future activities: "Volunteering is a great way to make a big difference, and anyone can do it! Experts report it can reduce stress and make you healthier. There's so much more we could achieve with extra help; the impact could be huge!"
