

My Covid-19 test

I had noticed the Covid-19 testing station on Somerleyton Road and wondered how it operated. People who have had symptoms and requested tests online at nns.uk/coronavirus or called 119 are given appointments before they arrive at the site.

I was offered a test at Somerleyton Road and was impressed by the adherence to social distancing, use of masks, gloves and aprons and a healthy dose of good humour. I took a swab of my throat and nose and popped it in a bag. I felt very reassured about the whole process. I received a text message that same evening to say I had tested positive. I was phoned up to discuss the result from one of the contact tracers who asked for any contacts within the previous two days.

I self-isolated for seven days, socially-distanced from my partner who stayed in for 14 days. He was content to self-isolate recognising that this was a way of protecting himself and others.

I am encouraging residents who have symptoms of a high temperature, a new and continuous cough, or a loss of taste or smell to go on to **nhs.uk/coronavirus** or call **119** and book a test. It's a way of looking after yourself and helping others.





Tackling climate injustice

In 2019, Lambeth became the first London council to declare a climate emergency and committed to becoming a carbon-neutral council by 2030.



To work towards a borough-wide climate action plan, Lambeth's first citizens' assembly on climate change was due to take place in summer 2020. Due to the coronavirus, the citizens' assembly has been postponed, but we want to use this time to get all communities in Lambeth talking about climate change, the impacts it will have on our borough, the solutions that exist already and those people want to see as part of a green, inclusive recovery.

We're building a new website where we will share what we have collated so far and people in Lambeth can share and map climate change solutions, ideas and challenges. We will also be running a series of engagement activities and webinars over the next few months to hear from as many different people in the borough as possible.

Lambeth offering compensation

A charity and a local grass roots partnership, Voice4Change England and Black Thrive, have been appointed by Lambeth Council to support the Black community's access to a financial redress scheme to compensate victims of child abuse whilst in care at Lambeth Children's Home and Shirley Oaks Primary School. The two organisations are working to ensure that everyone is compensated, particularly people of Black African and Caribbean heritage, currently underrepresented amongst those who have claimed redress. The Lambeth Children's Homes Redress Scheme has been extended to the new closing date of 5pm on 1 January 2022.

Lambeth's Redress Scheme was the first of its kind in the United Kingdom. Since the launch of the scheme, in January 2018, more than 1,602 people have applied, and over £46.4 million has been paid out in compensation.

Voice4Change England and Black Thrive have launched a new website providing easier access for people to apply for redress, clarifying any concerns and addressing barriers people may have when applying.

Meet the cabinet

Cllr Sonia Winifred talks about Lambeth's support for the Black Lives Matter Movement and the actions taken to investigate the disproportionality of Covid cases in BAME communities.



How is the council supporting the BLM movement?

Witnessing the distressing scenes of George Floyd's murder by a white police officer kneeling on his neck as he grasped for air, was beyond belief. The demonstrations and protests brought about by his murder across the world are the voices of black people and white people coming together saying 'enough is enough!' Lambeth has a wonderfully diverse and tolerant community of which we are proud.

On 22 June we commemorated the contributions made to this country by the Windrush generation and their legacy in Brixton. The council will carry out an audit of all statues, monuments, landmarks, street names and works of art in Lambeth linked to slavery. On completion we will consult with the community sharing the outcomes. Decisions will be made collectively.

What are the actions taken regarding Covid cases and deaths in BAME communities?

The disproportionality of BAME casualties to Covid-19 is staggering, it seems to reflect the disproportionality of inequalities experienced by black people in UK society. Despite making

up only 14 per cent of the population, these groups are most likely to be on the frontline whether in the NHS as care workers, shelf stackers in supermarkets, bus and cab drivers. While the difference between ethnic groups in Covid-19 mortality is partly a result of socio-economic disadvantage, a remaining part of the difference has not yet been explained.

The council is taking action by carrying out a community survey with our residents. We want to hear about how they are coping and their thoughts on life post Covid-19.

We have also been speaking with community groups, businesses and Faiths Together in Lambeth to discuss their fears and concerns around reopening. We are listening to them and supporting with risk assessments.

We want to continue networking to ensure services are tailored to the needs of the BAME community. The council is committed to listening and working with all our communities to discuss what our services will look like post Covid-19.

The Annual Electoral Canvass is changing!

Lambeth's Electoral
Registration Officer must
undertake a canvass of all
households in the borough each
year to check voter details are
correct. This year the electoral
canvass is changing.

We will be contacting all residential properties in Lambeth from late July.

Must I respond to the Canvass Notification?

New canvassing rules allow us to check voter details against other records. This means some households will not need to respond to the notification.

You must respond if:

 Any information is incorrect on the form, or there are people eligible to register to vote at your address who are not included on the form

OR

 The notification you receive states that you must respond

How can I respond?

The quickest and easiest way to respond is online at householdresponse.com/

You will need to enter the twopart security code which is also printed on the form. Anyone in the household can respond.

If you do not provide the requested information we may need to make a personal visit to your property to confirm voter

details. Please help us save time and council funds by responding to the form as quickly as possible.

Why is being registered to vote important?

- You can only vote at elections if you are registered.
- The electoral register is used for other important functions, including by credit reference agencies to help calculate your credit score.
- If your name is not on the register, you may not be able to get credit, a mortgage or a mobile phone contract.


Look out for your canvass notification in July!



The independent Local Government Boundary Commission England (the Commission) is asking for residents' help in drawing up a new pattern of electoral wards in Lambeth.

The Commission will be giving more information about the review and answering questions at an online briefing on 13 July at 6pm. You can watch the live briefing on Lambeth Council's website at https://bit.ly/31iZmVP and the video will be available after the meeting. Information is also available on the Commission's website https://www.lgbce.org.uk/

Lambeth Council is split into 21 electoral wards. Each one is represented on the council by



three councillors who are elected every four years to represent the best interests of the residents in their ward. Some council services and also neighbourhood policing are organised by ward.

In drawing up the new wards, the Commission aims to ensure that each councillor represents roughly the same number of voters.

The review will also try to create wards that as far as possible reflect the interests and identities of communities across Lambeth. Since the last review in 1999 the population in some of the wards has grown more than others and there is more development taking place, particularly in the north of the borough.

Your views about the boundaries

are therefore important in ensuring effective governance for Lambeth in future.

The Commission would like to hear opinions on:

- the number of wards
- the names of wards
- where the boundaries between wards should lie
- the number of councillors for each ward.


